Apsara Handwriting Activity (26th October):





Personality of the month

Sudha Varghese famously known as 'sister Sudha' or 'Didi' was born in 1949 in Kottayam in the state of Kerala, India. She is an Indian socialist, scholar, educationist, nun and philanthropist. In 1965, Sudha with the sisters of Notre Dame shifted to Bihar to work for the welfare of the hungry and poor people of Bihar. For few years she lived there and worked as a teacher. In 1986, she resigned from her job to educate the 'Musahars' and moved into a complex of brick and mud houses. In 1989, she obtained a law degree and fought for the justice of women who were victims of abuse, rape, and sexual harassment. She shifted to Patna in 2005 where she built a school named 'Prerna' which means inspiration. This girls' school was opened in the year 2006 to remove girls from farm labour and to ensure they receive education. After she initiated awareness, 125 girls were enrolled with the school. Sudha taught the girls Fundamental Rights guaranteed to them by our constitution. In addition to the standard curriculum, the school also teaches arts, dance, and karate which would give the girls self-confidence and also selfprotection. The girls of Prerna Chhatravas became so proficient that they won five gold, five silver and 14 bronze medals at a competition in Gujarat in 2011, earning a trip to the Asian Junior Karate Championships in Japan, where they won seven trophies. For all that she has given to society, she was recognised and was conferred by the Padma Shri award in 2006.










