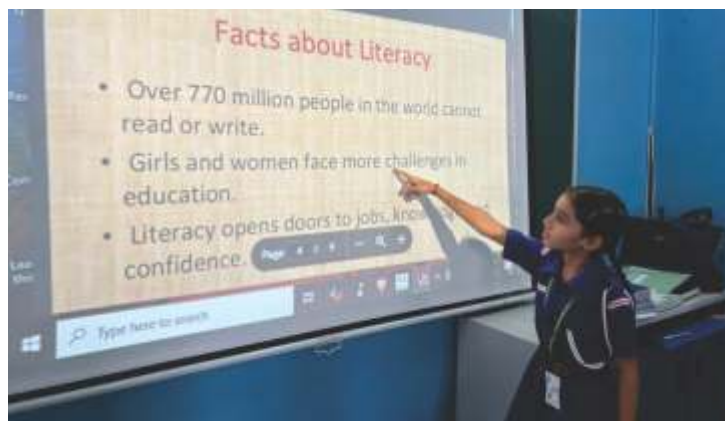


Special Assemblies

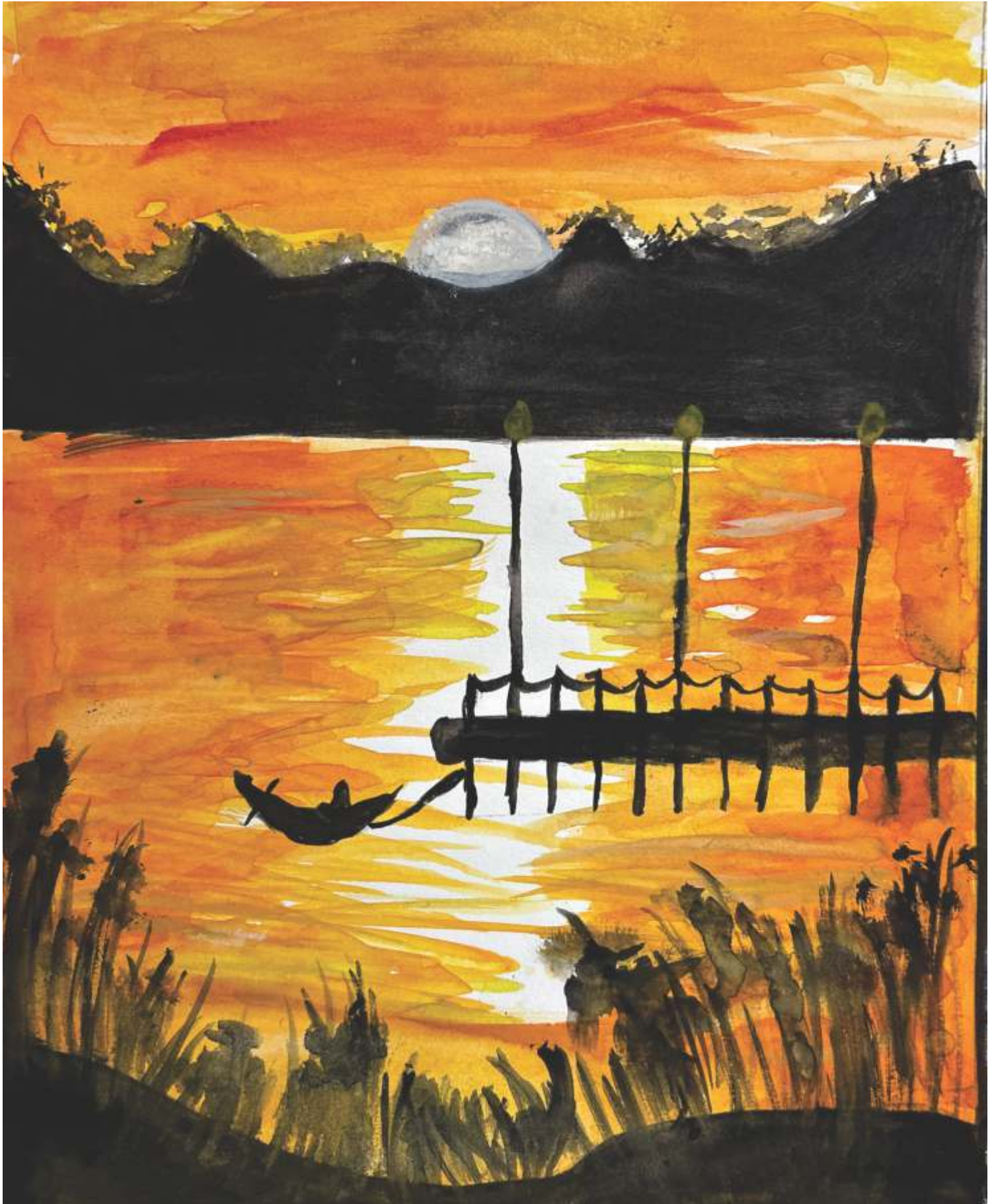
