In 1950, Mother Teresa established a religious congregation which was initially dedicatedly to serving "the poorest of the poor" in the slums of Calcutta. Mother Teresa was recognised as a divine inspiration who devoted herself to taking care of the sick and poor. She took the initiative to establish Nirmal Hriday, where people with terminal illnesses were treated and taken care of. Along with this, Mother Teresa also established schools, hospitals, nursing centres, dispensaries, and Shanti Nagar, which is also known as the "Town of Peace". In the year 1962, the Indian government awarded one of the highest civilian honours, Padma Shri, for her tireless service to the people of India. Mother Teresa, in her lifetime, received many honours and rewards, like, Ramon Magsaysay Peace Prize and a Nobel Peace Prize in the year 1979. Mother Teresa lived for 87 years, teaching us the way of living, which she believed was by being available for people in need. Mother Teresa once said that "A life not lived for others is not a life". She wholeheartedly dedicated her life to serving the people who needed help, love and care. She inspires everyone to be selfless and dedicated to serving the community so that the world becomes a better place to live in.
